RECENT ACTIVITIES

In mid-May, I had occasion to attend and bring opening remarks at the CSCE's 21st Canadian Hydrotechnical Conference held in Banff, AB. The theme of the conference was "Recent flood management lessons in Canada." Mike Bender, the conference chair, and his organizing committee are to be commended for a job very well done! Some of the conference statistics included: 170 registrants (including delegates from 6 countries other than Canada and from 7 of our provinces), 4 short courses, 6 plenary presentations, and 67 paper presentations. And all of this was held in a wonderful conference venue, the Banff Springs Hotel.

One of the delegates to the hydrotechnical conference was Charlie Neill of Edmonton, who is well-known in Canada's hydrotechnical community. I make special mention of Charlie as he was one of the organizers of the first CSCE hydrotechnical conference, which was held in Edmonton in 1973 and was the first of all CSCE specialty conferences. In addition, I am pleased to say that Charlie was an author of one of the conference papers, he was the 1981 recipient of the Society's Camille A. Dagenais Award, the third recipient of CSCE's premier hydrotechnical engineering award, and he was one of my early mentors as I started my working career many years ago. Congratulations Charlie, and thank you!

On May 9, I had occasion to attend the annual dinner and general meeting of my home section, the Saskatoon Section. Following a delightful German-style dinner, we were treated to an excellent presentation on the oilsands of northern Alberta by Prof. Lee Barbour. The annual meeting followed. What is of interest to note is that the majority of the Section executive comprises Associate Members; I am very proud of the leadership role that these younger members are taking in the Society.

UPCOMING ACTIVITIES

I will be attending the Engineering Institute of Canada (EIC) Board meeting in Montreal on May 26. I will also attend EIC's climate change conference (CCTC 2013), which follows, as well as the institute's Award's Gala on May 28. Four of our members will be receiving Fellow Awards in EIC, while one will be receiving a career award. I very much look forward to congratulating the recipients for the honors received.

On May 29, the opening day of the annual conference, I will be participating in our annual Operations Workshop, along with several other senior executive members and our Executive Director. This workshop is intended for all leaders of the Society, including Section chairs, committee and division chairs, and others.

Of course, the upcoming CSCE annual conference in Montreal is a major event for all of us in the Society and one which I particularly look forward to enjoying. As I reflect back on my time as a CSCE member, and if my memory has not failed me, this will be my 27th CSCE annual conference, the first one being in 1979. At the Montreal conference, I will be participating in the two historic site commemorations, in presiding over our annual general meeting, and in being host at the Awards Banquet.

I am pleased that we will soon be renewing the long-standing agreement that we have had with our sister civil engineering society, the American Society of Civil Engineers. ASCE President, Greg DiLoreto, will join me in signing the agreement, along with our executive directors, Doug Salloum and Patrick Natale, at our upcoming annual conference in Montreal. Among other things, the agreement provides for a \$25 member discount for a member that wishes to also join the other society.

John Bell of Vancouver was declared the Founding President of CSCE, while Camille A. Dagenais of Montreal was the first elected President of the newly-formed constituent society.
